

Conditionals

I. Conditional type I

- The form: if + simple present + simple future
 Simple future + if + simple present
- ❖ The use: conditional type I is used when we speak about present or future activities and situation which are really possible.
- Example: If I pass my driving test next week, I will buy a little car.
 Sara will succeed if she works hard.

II. Conditional type II

- The form: if + simple past + would (+ bare infinitive)
 would (+ bare infinitive) + if + simple past
- ❖ The use: conditional type II is used when we imagine the consequences of present or future activities and situations which are not very probable or which do not even exist (unreal).
- ❖ Example: If I were a doctor, I would help sick people.
 - We would learn English very quickly if we lived in England.

NB: 'were' replaces was after I, she, he, it in this type of conditional sentences.

III. Conditional type III

- ❖ The form: if + past perfect + would have (+ past participle)
 would have (+ past participle) + if + past perfect
- The use: conditional type III is used when imagine the possible consequences of past actions and situations which did not in fact happen (regret)
- Example: If she hadn't worked hard, she wouldn't have passed the exam.
 - Jim wouldn't have been injured if he hadn't run into the road.
